Report from the Rector & Missioner

As the year 2020 began, St. Andrew's Episcopal Church was cruising along with its liturgical, pastoral, educational and outreach ministries. We had begun to better engage children and families, and we were searching for a new Music Director. The coronavirus pandemic, of course, threw everything into disarray. Thanks to the efforts of the search committee and the guidance of the Holy Spirit, Jack Barben arrived from San Diego, California on Monday, 23 March 2020. Public worship had been suspended the day before, but as we scrambled to provide online worship, Jack's skills and gifts were immediately evident.

We are hugely grateful to the army of volunteers who have contributed to our varied menu of worship in 2020. When Suza Lambert Bowser put her film-making skills at the disposal of St. Andrew's, we opted for pre-recorded Sunday services because it would (we hoped) provide a rich worship experience. Although we lost the immediacy of being gathered together in real time, many people expressed gratitude for the way the music and videography helps connect them to God. Having people contribute readings and prayers from their homes and yards proved compelling, and many viewers appreciated being able to participate more fully in the liturgy than they expected. Parishioners also shared the YouTube link with friends and family, so viewership of our pre-recorded Sunday worship ranged between 163 (18th Sunday after Pentecost) and 677 (Easter Sunday). Midday Prayer via Zoom on weekdays has created a wonderful community of 6-10 faithful worshipers throughout the pandemic. Admittedly, no matter how well done, online worship can be a struggle for many people. Thanks to Shelly and many volunteers, we overcame logistical challenges to offer in-person, outdoor Eucharists from July through November and then created a Nativity Story Walk so that people could safely experience the wonder of Christmas outdoors. In addition, Aaron hosted Sunday evening worship on Zoom during Advent that was especially helpful for families. Liturgy demanded a huge chunk of staff time in 2020, especially after we added our monthly InSpirit service in October. But having lost so much human connection during the pandemic, we need God more than ever, and we trust that our online worship is helping people to hold fast to Christ. We are hugely grateful to everyone who is contributing to our liturgies, and the choir deserves special mention for its ministry.

In terms of Christian education and formation, Faith & Issues made a quick transition to Zoom under the leadership of the Rev. Dr. Katrina Wagner, and Novel & Reel Theology continued to meet monthly to discuss books and films. Many church members heard the Rev. Dr. Kathleen Rusnak lecture on the "kingdom of heaven" in the Gospel of Matthew. Denied the Eucharist on most Sundays by COVID-19, people learned to worship at home and to discover God anew in scripture and prayer.

The Thrift Shop adapted to the pandemic with its curbside drop-offs and outdoor sales and managed to reopen in the Fall before the winter spike in COVID cases prompted its closure. The Outreach Commission raised nearly \$60,000 from our Last Sunday Offerings for Navajoland, El Hogar in Honduras, earthquake relief in Puerto Rico, an Episcopal hospital in Gaza, Dismas Home in Manchester, Clinique St. Esprit in Haiti, the revolving Immigrant Bail fund, and the community ministry of Epiphany, Newport — all thanks to the generosity of our congregation, including those who contributed to the matching fund. Another \$13,400 went from our core budget to the likes of KREM, KLS Food Pantry, the Friendly Kitchen, the Episcopal Chaplaincy at DHMC, the United Thank Offering, hurricane relief in Honduras, and summer camps (Coniston, Wilmot and Barbara C. Harris). Instead of a full-fledged stewardship campaign, we

opted for a simple letter from the rector, and then held our breath. We need not have worried — we exceeded our \$400,000 target!

Our Christian stewardship was also evident in our building — we replaced our oil furnace with condenser propane boilers that are kinder to the environment (and our fuel budget), and then parishioners responded generously at year's end to help Epiphany fully insulate its building. Our church buildings and grounds receive wonderful care from a cadre of volunteers, as does our online "shop window" through our website and Facebook page. And thanks to the newly-established Art Committee, our inner decor is also receiving loving (and sometimes muchdebated!) attention.

After two terms as church warden, Bruce Avery retires from the Vestry. The last eighteen months have been a huge challenge for Bruce and Shirley after doctors found a large cancerous tumor between his hip and pelvis that has proved difficult to eradicate completely. Through all the chemotherapy, Bruce has continued to lead in his wise, quiet, and extremely competent and committed ways, often joining meetings from the hospital via his iPad. We have so valued Bruce's steady hand and shrewd counsel, and we know that everyone at St. Andrew's joins us in thanking him for his service to St. Andrew's as church warden.

When COVID-19 hit, pastoral care became difficult. Unable to visit people at home or in hospitals or care facilities, we struggled as pastors. There were driveway visits and outdoor conversations as well as telephone calls, texts and email conversations, but there is no question that pastoral care has suffered in 2020. Administering last rites over the telephone is a poor substitute for tracing the sign of the cross on a dying person's forehead while pronouncing God's forgiveness of their sin, sharing Holy Communion for the last time, and anointing them with oil of healing while praying that God will release them from suffering, deliver them from every evil, preserve them in all goodness, and bring them to everlasting life. When Jay ministered to our beloved Marjorie Forbes at the end of her life, little did we suspect how difficult it would be for those we would lose in the remaining eleven months of 2020 and for their families and friends: Priscilla Ohler, Karin Nelson, Bill Whitehouse, Amy Bailey, Rob Freitas, Hank Otto, Sheila Mitchell, Karla Sanders, Walter Wojtczak, Taffy Beckman and Deborah Lambert.

Inspiration in 2020 often came from our young people. It was such a joy to see St. Andrew's transformed when more than fifty people gathered together to play, create and worship at our first Messy Church in February. By hosting a vigil a few days after the murder of George Floyd, our high school youth group enabled us to safely protest and pray together. Our online liturgies have been enriched by young contributors: high schoolers helped lead the imaginative online liturgy in August and younger children worked with Nicole Densmore to fashion a lovely Gospel Alleluia for Advent. In deciding to create an individual prayer flag for every Granite Stater who has died from COVID, our high schoolers are helping us to grieve while we prayerfully decorate the flags. As we gaze at the white fabric and ponder what to write or draw, as we consider which snippet of scripture might be best, we understand anew what 2020 has taught us: that in days of calamity there can be calm; in times of perplexity, peace; in sickness, solace; in sorrow, song; in bereavement, blessing.

The Wardens' Report

Music at St. Andrew's

I started my tenure here at St. Andrew's right as the lockdown began. Immediately, we needed to find a way to make music and worship together and we decided together to do pre-recorded services, in order to allow us to incorporate a virtual choir and as many parishioners as possible for readings, prayers, etc. Since April, we've recorded over 20 services, having an average of 4 choir songs per service. Nicole Densmore has led a number of virtual choir projects with the children at St Andrew's, adding much to our services. The choir has met online each Thursday evening. In addition, with a grant from the diocese, we began to film InSpirit services in the Fall. These incorporated a wide variety of different styles of music, filmed live. These services have been well received with a large viewership. In spite of the challenges posed by the year, we have been able to make much beautiful music, reaching out beyond our own walls, incorporating musicians from around the country and new musicians in our community. This has not only nourished our community, but has been shared and enjoyed by friends and family around the world.

Treasurer's Report

As with everything else, the year 2020 and its pandemic presented some substantial challenges for the church's finances. However, overall, St. Andrew's came through the year well. Although the congregation met its \$400K pledge budget, many other revenue categories were not able to meet plan. As a result, total operating revenue was \$74K below budget.

On the expense side, we were able to come close to matching the operating revenue shortfall. This was due, in part, to the unfortunate fact that we were unable to be together in person through much of the year. Also, we spent a few months between David Almond's departure and Jack Barben's arrival. Combined, these resulted in personnel expense savings of \$6K, operating expense reductions of \$54K and program expense savings of \$11K.

With the benefit of our income stream from investments, we finished the year with a small deficit.

In the spring, we used the Payroll Protection Program to borrow \$50,300. So long as we met certain criteria during the measurement period, we would be eligible for forgiveness of some portion of the loan. We accomplished that and at the end of the year; the entire loan was forgiven. With the conversion of the PPP loan to a grant, our liabilities were limited to accounts payable of less than \$5K and obligations under restricted grants and donations of slightly less than \$88K.

We finished the year with \$185K in cash, \$781K in investments and \$367K in fixed assets (equipment, buildings and land). As a result, St. Andrew's Total Assets at 12/31/20 were \$1,432K versus \$1,406K at the end of last year. After the effect of the PPP conversion, we ended the year with a fund balance (net worth) of approximately \$1,350K.

Youth Music at St. Andrew's

The virtual format allowed me to spend more one-on-one time with families as we prepared pieces for on-line worship services. This new format also allowed me to teach parts independently of each other. When the two lines were melded together, they created a beautiful harmony. So much so, a congregant remarked at one of the Zoom coffee hours, "The Upbeat kids have never sounded better!" My continued hope is the children will experience the joy of sharing their musical talent and have success in performing, as well as encounter the love of God in this welcoming community.

The Upbeat Choir opportunities play a vital role in bringing new families to St. Andrew's. To have a program such as ours, which allows families to come together as their children participate in making music during worship services, is special indeed. This experience enriches not just the lives of the children as they come together in a well- rounded, faith based experience, but our congregation as a whole.

It has been an honor and a delight to guide the children through their exploration of music and more importantly, as they come to see how music not only connects them to the world around them, but brings them closer to God. I look forward to shepherding them through this journey for a long time to come.

Eucharistic Service Ministers Lectors, Intercessors, Eucharistic Ministers, Ushers, and Acolytes

Eucharistic Service Ministers serve at each service on Sundays and special services on Holy Days or at a celebration of life.

In addition to enjoying the fellowship of being together safely outside during our walk around Kezar Lake, we were also able to raise \$561 for United Thank Offering ministries responding to COVID-19. This past Fall, we continued to find ways to stay connected in service and fellowship. In November, we gathered to make posters to inspire hope and Christian Unity during the fraught election season, and to provide cards and inspirational notes to accompany the gift cards sent to families in need as part of the annual Thanksgiving Basket Project.

In December, we attended the Memorial Vigil for the Homeless in Newport and began working on a Covid-19 Prayer Flag which will be shared with the wider community in the coming months in memory of those who have lost their lives to the pandemic and in honor of the health care workers who continue to put their lives on the line to protect us.

St. Andrew's is most definitely blessed with a group of inspiring and deeply compassionate young folks who consistently seek to promote justice and serve others. Due to the exigencies of the pandemic and the fact that we do not seek funds in the month of December, St. Andrew's had eight, rather than twelve, months of recipients for our *Last Sunday Outreach Offering* in 2020. And, yet, with our anonymous donors' matching support, we gave away a record-breaking \$59,683! The emergency offering April for Navajoland saw our \$10,861 donation doubled to \$21,722 - or enough to provide food and water for 300 families. In addition to Navajoland, we also supported:

We opened in October with the blessing of the vestry and were open two days a week for two hours each day. This was a very exciting time as we were able to move Christmas clothing and items from storage into the shop for sale.

JoAnn Lyon has become my right hand assistant and has been there during all of these uncertain months, as have the many volunteers who continued their service to the shop and the church being available whenever needed. We send out a huge sincere thank you to everyone who helped at our outdoor and indoor sales. We couldn't have done it without them.

Sadly, we were asked to close again just before Christmas because of Covid-19, and we remain closed even to this day, with the hopes that we can reopen in the near future, if only one day a week and following strict pandemic guidelines.

As an added bonus, we offered all college students a 20% discount to encourage student shopping. We posted notices in school buildings at Colby Sawyer, and encouraged students to pass the word to their friends.

In addition to St. Andrew's, we chose to make cash donations to the School Nurses' Health Emergency Fund in area schools.

Thursday Tots

Green Committee

The energy audit of the St. Andrew's building was completed in June 2019. That fall, we began implementing the report's recommendations with substantial air sealing and insulation work. This portion of insulation work was completed in early 2020.

The next major recommendation was to replace our two aging oil-fired boilers with two condensing propane boilers. The new boilers were installed last summer and will significantly reduce our carbon footprint, in part because propane is less carbon-intensive than oil. In addition, the particular boiler model we chose is capable of burning fuel at ten different levels of intensity, depending on demand, which means we won't waste fuel by creating excessive heat that doesn't get used.

Another Energy Audit recommendation that was implemented in 2020 was the installation of a heat-reducing film on the windows in the parish hall and the glass above the altar in the sanctuary. The purpose of this film is to save energy by retaining heat in the winter, and in the summer keep these spaces cooler by rejecting outside heat, especially from afternoon sunlight.

One other way we saved fuel in 2020 is, fortunately, temporary. Due to the pandemic, most rooms in the church are currently not being used. So, with the exception of the offices, we have lowered both daytime and nighttime temperatures throughout the building.

Minutes of the Annual General Meeting 2 February 2020

With about 50 parishioners present and representing a quorum, Jay opened the meeting with words of welcome and a prayer.

<u>Motion</u> was made and duly seconded, and so voted to accept the Annual Report of 2019 as written and received.

<u>Motion</u> was made and duly seconded, and so voted to accept the Minutes of the Annual General Meeting of 2019 as written and received.

Clerk Alice Perry presented the slate of vestry, warden, treasurer and Western Convocation nominees as follows:

Vestry for three years: Joe Daly, Chris Heyl, Greg Vogt -- Term Expires January 2023

Warden for two years: Marni Eaton -- Term Expires January 2022

Treasurer for three years: Mike Quinn, Term Expires January 2023

Western Convocation Delegate for three years: Pat Goodwin -- Term Expires January 2023

There being no nominations from the floor, <u>Motion</u> was made and duly seconded, and so voted to approve the slate.

Jay thanked outgoing vestry member Harvey Best for all the hours he devoted to vestry business in addition to the work he and Rosie do for the church. Applause followed.

In introducing the 2020 budget approved by the Vestry at its December 2019 meeting, Jay introduced Treasurer Mike Quinn. Jay also noted that Mike's wife Froncie serves on the KREM

board, along with Jen Giles and Connie Appel.

Motion was made and duly seconded, and so voted to receive the proposed budget for 2020.

A slide show prepared by Suza Lambert Bowers offered "the year in review" in pictures.

Opening the meeting to questions and comments, John Jevne asked about the possible detrimental effects from the eternal candle above the ambry on the woodwork above. Jay assured him that the altar guild will ensure safety.

Nancy Rollins offered kudos for all that is happening between St. Andrew's and Epiphany and wondered if there was a capital reserve in place for what she called the "two aging structures." Jay noted we will continue to explore what the partnership between the two congregations implies. He added that our Vestry has been looking at Old St. Andrew's in terms of upkeep and has been putting \$10,000 aside each year for all major capital projects. We must be prudent how we use the existing endowment and have been fortunate to be able to continue growing our investment fund with the Diocese, Jay said.

Caroline Lockhart asked about the Diocesan fair share. Under Bishop Rob the percentage has been going down, now at 15%. Jay was pleased to highlight two recent grants from the diocese: \$25,000 towards Green Committee projects and \$20,000 from the Mission Resources Committee for Church and Children Together. Missioner Aaron Jenkyn noted that 2019 was the first year in a long time that Epiphany was able to meet their fair share – and that St. Andrew's support was helpful in that regard. Jay concluded with a reminder of the upcoming Messy Church services, at Epiphany on 8 February and at St. Andrew's on 16 February, and invited volunteers to help with those activities.

Jerry Coogan asked how Jay feels about attendance/growth at 10 AM. Jay responded by noting it will take time and we must be patient and persevere. He looks forward to developing afterschool programs, possibly dodge ball, in order to build a relationship with families — and then invite them to church. Aaron noted that the 2020 Lenten series "Signs of Life" will help us in answering why church matters and help in the effort to grow the church.

Katrina Wagner asked about the vacant apartment at Epiphany. Jay responded that it is being held empty because our search for a music director for St. Andrew's includes the possibility of someone also accepting the Upbeat role in Newport, in which case the apartment might be important for that person. Should that not develop, Aaron foresees using the space to help with housing needs in Newport.

Leslie Smith commented that some 30 years ago a speaker had stated that the last remaining institution in North America that is truly intergenerational is the church: women, men and children of all ages in the same building at the same time . . . St. Andrew's is right to pursue the goal of families together.

Jay invited parishioners to visit Hugo Anderson's gallery and an upcoming exhibition at Bar Harbor Bank entitled "Growing Up with the Atomic Bomb."

There being no other business to come before the meeting, the meeting adjourned at 9:50 AM with a silent prayer and our mutual blessing.
