ST. ANDREW'S January—February 2022

Jay's Say:

I had an 8.30 appointment with the Right Reverend Mark Beckwith this morning. We met at the base of the Sunapee Express, and in between ski runs, we chatted about Braver Angels and what it might offer St. Andrew's and our region.

At an online orientation last month, Mark was delighted to meet Woody Canaday, Jeannie Sperry and Jennifer Giles (who sang with his Mom Heidi in our choir and at Woodcrest Village during her final months). Our three other leaders (Peter Ruth, Penelope Whitman and David Balford) look forward to attending a similar workshop this month.

You don't have to wait for our initiative to get off the ground to engage with Braver Angels. Individuals can become members for an annual fee of \$12.

Jeannie has attended two workshops: Helping Loved Ones Divided by Politics and Depolarization Within. Among many other lessons, the first taught her that if you listen hard enough, it's often possible to find a shared value, while the second workshop is helping her deal constructively with stereotyping amongst fellow liberals.

Braver Angels aims for understanding rather than agreement. You won't be expected to compromise or water down your political beliefs. You will be expected to listen respectfully and to lay aside disdain, malice and arrogance.

I'm hoping that Braver Angels will engage those who lean Red (conservative) and Blue (liberal) and those who see themselves as purple somewhere in between. But I also hope that those who are deep burgundy and midnight blue will give Braver Angels a chance. If we patronize, shame or demonize those on the other end of the political spectrum, their reaction is often to double down which does our own cause no good.

Braver Angels shows us a different way. It's also the way of the Gospel.

Last Sunday Looks Ahead — 30 January Tornado Relief via Christ Episcopal Church, Bowling Green, KY

We have all seen photos of the devastation left by the series of tornadoes on 10 December in a number of states in the south and mid-west - particularly in Kentucky. And we have heard how this devastation has been reflected in the lives of so many. There is no question that we need to bring what help we can to those in need from this natural disaster. The only question is how we, over 1000 miles away, can best do that.

A first step was to find a partner organization on the ground in the disaster area that knows the need firsthand. We found this partner through the Episcopal Diocese of Kentucky. The Diocese recommended contacting one of the parishes in the affected area and providing financial support to it either directly or, if necessary, through the Diocese. That parish would, in turn, see that the money was used wisely in the best interests of those in need. We were led to Christ Episcopal Church in Bowling Green - in part because they are within an area of great devastation, in part because they are already a conduit for aid to the surrounding region. They are working closely with two school districts, in which many families with school-age children have lost everything. They are also working with St. John's Episcopal Church in Murray, the Episcopal church closest to Mayfield, perhaps the hardest hit community in the affected area.

One of the questions we discussed with the Christ Church Tornado Relief Coordinator Cindy concerned the timing of our financial aid. She indicated that they expect greater financial needs in the January-February period due to rental and utility bills and felt that receipt of funds in early February after a January Last Sunday Appeal at St. Andrew's would fit well with their relief effort.

This message from Cindy to all of us at St. Andrew's: "Your email brought tears to my eyes - your generosity is overwhelming and your caring even more overwhelming."

As always, there will be more information on Tornado Disaster Relief weekly throughout January, and your financial donation in this appeal will be matched.

Last Sunday Looks Ahead — 27 February Dismas Home of New Hampshire

"For 21 months I was just a number. When I left prison and came to Dismas Home, the staff helped me reclaim my name and my life." – **former DHNH resident**

Dismas Home of New Hampshire (DHNH) is a state-licensed 90-day residential alcohol and drug rehabilitation treatment and transitional program for previously incarcerated women, located in Manchester that currently houses up to eight women. The program accepts women from every area of the NH criminal justice system and provides participants with residential support for a full year. Founded in 2016, DHNH is not just a house. It is a home that offers a second chance at life, with the support needed for recovery, family reunification and successful reentry into life outside of prison.

Generations of incarcerated women have faced enormous obstacles related to their rehabilitation and reentry due to gender discrimination. Overcrowding and lack of programming space, shortchanged education and vocational training, and lack of work and recreational opportunities complicate women's ability to rejoin their communities. In 2020, 140 women were released from NH state prison. Statistically, 43% of previously incarcerated women return to prison. Since its opening, more than 62 women have participated in DHNH's one-of-a-kind treatment program, and to date <u>none</u> has returned to prison or jail.

DHNH operates fully staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The trained and certified staff is responsible for alcohol, drug and mental health counseling. Additionally, volunteer work includes board participation, visiting the residents, cooking and serving communal meals, resource development and communications, financial training, transportation, shopping, home improvements and maintenance.

A faith-based organization, DHNH provides a path to a second chance at life. The women of DHNH who make the brave decision to "do the work" that will change their lives have been moved by God's love and have "seen the light" and been transformed. DHNH partners with its residents to rebuild, transform, reorganize and adjust their lives around recovery and sobriety so they may discover the joy of a healthy and empowered life. It takes time to recover, with a stepped-down phasing of structured programming to encourage and support successful recovery and transition/reentry.



DHNH's vision is to serve at least 25 women at a time in its 90-day program and to add a second sober living home. This second home will offer more women a longer transition time to build life skills and independence. Additionally, DHNH's goal is to expand programming by bringing its model to other NH communities.

On average it costs \$215 per day per resident to operate DHNH. Contributions from individuals, foundations, corporations and government entities directly support DHNH's programs, services and special initiatives. With our help, DHNH can continue to slow the cycle of recidivism, rebuild broken families and positively support our NH communities.

Wardens' Words

Happy New Year! Little did I know when I wrote those words as we approached 2020, that we would spend the next two years social distancing, wearing masks in public, unable to gather together in church and in other places, service trips canceled, etc., etc. ZOOM meetings became the new normal, as did worshipping on line! 2021 has not been much different. How lucky we are to be led by such a creative priest and this year that includes his tech-savvy family!

One of the things I did while taking Education for Ministry was to explore the prayer book and read the Catechism, which begins on page 845 of the Book of Common Prayer (BCP). If you haven't read it before, I suggest that you take the time now — and if you have read it, it is always good to take the time to review it as we begin a new church year. The questions and answers on the top of page 855 are particularly important to the church and its mission today. We have accepted the invitation of "Becoming Beloved Community." This past year many of us participated in the Sacred Ground program where discussions allowed us to come to grips with racism and white privilege in our own lives. This was not easy for some of us, but well worth the time and effort to discover "who we are and what things we have done and left undone regarding racial justice and healing."

2022 will give us a chance to learn and work together to depolarize our political discourse by working with Braver Angels. The mission of the church is to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ by promoting justice, peace and love, and all its members are to carry out this mission. Thank you to those who led the Sacred Ground groups and to those who will lead us in the Braver Angels program.

My time on the vestry is coming to a rapid end. I have been privileged to work with so many wonderful people over these last few years and I thank you for that opportunity. I leave you in the capable hands of Joe Daly and a new warden to be elected at annual meeting, and members of the vestry, old and soon-to-be new. I close with a paraphrased quote of C.S. Lewis that I found on the nhepiscopal.org website: "We cannot go back and change the beginning... but what we can do is start where we are now and create a different ending." May those words guide us as we continue to follow Jesus in the way of love. — Marni Eaton






