Jay's Say: The Chosen

I am writing on 21 December, the Feast of Saint

Thomas — the doubting disciple who ends up making the boldest statement of faith recorded in the Gospels. Encountering the risen Jesus personally, Thomas blurts: "My Lord and my God."

I invite you to watch the first three seasons of a show called *The Chosen* because this TV Jesus might similarly crack open your heart. Like other actors in the show, Jonathan Roumie actually looks Middle Eastern (his father is Egyptian) and gives us an astonishingly fresh and Jewish Jesus. But most of the episodes teach us about Jesus through the eyes and lives of his followers and of those who are swept up in his ministry. As we witness the disciples changing, we are drawn into their transformation. When Peter, Mary Magdalen, Thomas and the others become more fully alive and strive to love as recklessly as their rabbi, viewers can feel the claim of Jesus on their lives.

The acting, script, cinematography and soundtrack are first-rate and the episodes are often gritty and gripping. Conceived and directed by Dallas

Jenkins, an evangelical Christian, the show features no major stars and is funded by donations from viewers and venture investors rather than a Hollywood studio. *The Chosen* won't be to everyone's taste, but I'm very much enjoying it.

The script is true to the Gospels but employs Jewish *midrash* — imaginative tales that fill the gaps

between the lines of scripture. So we get fictional and sometimes elaborate backstories of the first disciples whose actions and conversations reveal their internal struggles. The early episodes are barely biblical, but stick with the show because these added elements end up being faithful to the core message of the Gospels.

The political, social and religious divisions within Judaism are artfully rendered, as are the brutalities of the Roman occupation. Some of the casting decisions for the disciples were inspired. Matthew the tax collector is autistic.

"Little James" is played by an actor whose severe scoliosis and minor cerebral palsy left him with a limp. In a memorable conversation in Season 3, Jesus explains to James why he has healed all these other people but not him. Told by Jesus how God's power and glory can be revealed in human affliction, the actor found the conversation therapeutic.

Twenty-three of us will return from the Holy Land with the bible having come to life in new, exciting and possibly life-changing ways. Thanks to *The Chosen*, your TV or computer screen could quite possibly deliver the same result!

The Chosen is free to watch on Netflix and Amazon Prime, or you can download the Angel Studio App to your computer or television to watch all three seasons.

St. Andrew's and Braver Angels -



Like many of you, I am saddened by how polarized our country has become. Sometimes I question what any one person can do to help get members of differing political factions to listen to each other; perhaps as the first step toward their working together. I was therefore heartened to learn from Jay about a citizens' group called Braver Angels (BA), a national organization comprised of volunteers who seek to bridge the partisan divide in order to strengthen our nation. BA has developed effective tools to lower polarization, to facilitate the effective exchange of views and to help discover common values and beliefs. Much of its work involves providing workshops like those found at https://braverangels.org.

On 15 December 2022, I had the pleasure of observing moderator Bill Doherty, one of the founders of BA, present a workshop titled *Managing Difficult Conversations with Colleagues and Constituents* to members of the New Hampshire Legislature at the State House in Concord. Other BA team members included former New Hampshire state representatives Patricia Higgins and Doug Teschner, who now serves as the New England Regional Leader of BA. This was the second year that BA has addressed our legislators through its initiative known as *Braver Politics*. Braver Politics seeks to foster opportunities for elected officials and their staff to develop the skills and commitment to work together in goodwill across political differences. I found it encouraging that 102 New Hampshire state representatives (about evenly divided between Republicans and Democrats) chose to collaborate with the Braver Politics team. Watching the crowd of New Hampshire elected officials provide a standing ovation for Braver Politics at the conclusion of the workshop was a tremendously hopeful scene, particularly following the bitterly divisive mid-term elections we have just experienced.

Here in New London, our Saint Andrew's Braver Angels team — the Rev. Jay MacLeod, Jeannie Sperry, (moderator), Woody Canaday, (organizer), Paul Catsos, David Balford, Jennifer Giles and Peter Ruth — has hosted four similar learning sessions for our parish during 2022. In 2023, our plan is to make BA workshops and other learning experiences available to all in the New London area. If you are looking for ways to help depolarize our community, please consider participating in an upcoming BA event. All are invited to join in a reprise of Braver Angels' *Skills for Bridging the Divide* workshop in the Saint Andrew's parish hall on 26 February from 2:30 – 5 PM. Seating will be limited to 60 participants and registration will be provided by Eventbrite with the link to that site to be provided to the parish and community shortly. — *Paul Catsos*

Last Sunday Looks Ahead — 29 January Willing Hands

Willing Hands

If you should volunteer at The Haven food pantry in White River Junction, you will typically find 20 or more different fresh fruits and vege-

tables available for those in need. (You'll hear more about The Haven in September.). Willing Hands plays a significant role in this: making healthy food, which would otherwise often go to waste, available to those in need. Those are the three key elements to the work of Willing Hands: Making healthy food available for those in need while avoiding waste.

In 2021, Willing Hands provided 1,020,726 pounds of fresh fruits and vegetables to 85 recipient organizations in Vermont and New Hampshire at no cost to the organizations. How does this happen? Willing Hands drivers pick up fresh produce, dairy, eggs, meat and bread from food

donors including farms, grocery stores, wholesalers and restaurants. Volunteers glean leftover produce from local farms and grow produce in four Willing Hands gardens. Then Willing Hands drivers deliver this food six days a week, year-round, free to recipient organizations across the Upper Valley, including food pantries, shelters and senior housing facilities. To accomplish this, Willing Hands relies on 11 paid staff members and, currently, 566 volunteers.

In each of the following weeks in parish emails we will explore more fully three areas in which Willing Hands makes a significant impact: 1) Ending hunger, 2) Improving health, 3) reducing food waste. In the final weeks in January we will look to the future of Willing Hands

How can we help? As always, monetary gifts are welcome. Willing Hands also relies heavily on volunteers and offers many opportunities for essential, outdoor work among like-

Last Sunday Looks Ahead — 26 February Dismas Home

Getting a second chance at life. The Dismas Home was so grateful for our generous support last year. As we revisit this most important organization, we learn how complex reentry back into society is for women released from prison and facing a society that has branded them a felon.



The Dismas Home is working to break this cycle by providing a safe and supportive environment for previously incarcerated women as they transition back into society. Despite their success in helping residents overcome stigma, obstacles and barriers, they face significant challenges in their quest to expand their programs and increasing their capacity to serve more women. They have a new strategic plan that calls for program expansion in the next two years. This includes goals to

- · Secure a transitional home for post-residential living.
- · Create post-residential support programs.
- · Develop vocational training programs and opportunities.
- · Strengthen and expand fundraising and development.
- · Establish a capital reserve.
- · Create a multi-year financial plan.
- Please consider making a gift to the Dismas Home. Your donation will help them to create a better future for themselves.
- Establish viable, sustainable relationships with all New Hampshire criminal justice system sectors.
- Build relationships with landlords and developers to increase post-Dismas housing options.
- Build a network with service providers to increase operations efficiencies and increase resident opportunities.

 - · Build relationships with civic groups and municipalities.

Warden's Words

This is the final occasion of my penning Warden's Words. After six years on the Vestry (the last two as Warden) I will be finishing my term this January. It has been a pleasure, a privilege and an honor to serve in that role, and before I step down, I want to share a couple of thoughts with you.

As parishioners of St. Andrew's, we are all members of a vibrant community, one that is gaining new members and is financially sound, due to the untiring inspiration, leadership and guidance of Padre Jay over the last decade. Working with him as Warden, I have seen close-up just how devoted and committed he is to teaching and leading all of us, and others beyond, to walk with Jesus in the way of love. You've probably suspected that his work is seemingly never done. Indeed, I can't count the number of times I've received emails from him that were sent at 11 PM or 4 AM even though I knew he had been in meetings all day or working on services and then providing pastoral care to someone late into the evening. Several folks have asked me if Jay is working too much or taking care of himself, and the answer to both questions is "yes" – he does work long hours, but he does know how to pace himself. I only mention this to remind everyone that he does have only one true day off each week (Wednesday), so it is important not to ask him to get to you on that day as he needs that down time to replenish his batteries (see below).

Yes, our community is based principally on worship, but St. Andrew's is so much more than Sunday services. The myriad educational and Christian formation programs that Jay has initiated (the most recent being "God 101") present opportunities for learning more about our faith and ourselves. Looking back at the last ten years we have had retreats to Iona and the Holy Land, and missions to Navajoland; we have had our annual fairs and visits from inner city kids and have begun Messy Church to reach out to families with young children. We run a thrift shop and youth programs and serve the homeless at the Friendly Kitchen, among many other activities. We can always use more volunteers to help out on these non-worship events; as my mother always said, "Many hands make for light work." And, getting involved means more opportunities for fellowship and new friendships. Give it a try!

In closing, I just want to say that I am leaving you in the far-more-than-just-capable hands of your soon-to-be Senior Warden, Karen Zurheide. In her first year as Junior Warden, Karen brought a high level of energy and commitment to her role, and I know that St. Andrew's will surely benefit from her service in 2023, along with a new Junior Warden who will be elected at the annual meeting! — *Joe Daly*


