
ST. ANDREW'S November—December 2022

Jay's Say:

I'm writing after a busy All Saints' Sunday. In the morning we gathered to celebrate the Eucharist and savor our communion with the church departed before enjoying each other's company at coffee hour. In the afternoon we learned how to depolarize family political conversations in our Braver Angels workshop. In the evening, dozens gathered for God 101 to reflect on the core conviction of our faith: God is gloriously disclosed in Jesus of Nazareth. Compline brought All Saints' Sunday to a sublime close as our simple service was joined, as always, to the magnificent worship of the whole company of heaven around God's throne.

Like All Saints' Sunday, the Bishop's visit is a high point in the year of any Episcopal parish, doubly so when the visit comes on our patronal festival. The Right Reverend A. Robert Hirschfeld will preach and preside at the Holy Eucharist (which will include the rite of Confirmation) on the Feast of Saint Andrew at 7 PM on Wednesday, 30 November. Those who have not been baptized would be baptized and confirmed as part of this compelling liturgy.

The service of Confirmation (page 413 in the Book of Common Prayer) includes provision for those being received into the Episcopal Church. Reception is especially appropriate for those who were confirmed by a bishop in a different tradition (e.g. Roman Catholic, Lutheran, Methodist).



Please speak with me ASAP if you are interested in being baptized, confirmed or received. These are powerful events not just for the candidates but for the whole church. Every member of St. Andrew's is invited to attend. Actually, you're expected to attend!

St. Andrew's and Braver Angels

Braver Angels is a national organization that seeks to bridge the partisan divide and strengthen our nation. Because so many Americans no longer see their political opponents as simply wrong or misguided but as enemies to be loathed and defeated at all costs, Braver Angels has developed effective tools to lower polarization, to facilitate the effective exchange of views, and to discover common values and beliefs.

The St. Andrew's Braver Angels team hosted a workshop on Braver Angels Sunday, 30 October to discuss "Families and Politics - How to Talk with Loved Ones Across the Political Divide."

Presented by Jeannie Sperry and the team, 27 Saint Andrew's parishioners and friends participated in an engaging afternoon of learning communication skills developed to promote thoughtful listening and discussion of challenging topics with family and friends across the political spectrum.

This well-received workshop marked the fourth Braver Angels learning session held at St. Andrew's in 2022. The Braver Angels team — in addition to Jeannie Sperry, members include Woody Canaday, David Balford, Jennifer Giles, Peter Ruth, and Paul Catsos (replacing Penelope Whitman who has left the area) — plans to continue this series of workshops throughout the new year to serve the Saint Andrew's community. The team plans to invite other local faith communities to participate, eventually reaching out to the wider New London area community. Look for Saint Andrew's Braver Angels learning opportunities throughout 2023.

The Outreach Commission meets in person on the first Thursday of even-numbered months to receive and consider suggestions for our Last Sunday offering. We have agreed that our efforts should be focused on humanitarian needs, both domestic and international; and we welcome suggestions from parishioners. At our meetings we discuss potential recipients and decide who among us will do the required research and the writing.

Christmas at Sea is an annual St. Andrew's outreach project sponsored by the Seaman's Church Institute. Hand-crafted hats and scarves and new this year — vests, are given to mariners around the world who are many miles from their homes at holiday time. We have sent off one box of hats, scarves and vests already and will mail another box in mid-November. There is still time to start and finish a project. Last Sunday Looks Ahead — **27 November** Clinique Saint Esprit

Our *Last Sunday Outreach Offering* recipient is Clinique Saint Esprit in Croix des Bouquets, Haiti. St. Andrew's has helped to support the annual \$20,000 stipend of a pediatrician here for the past decade, ever since Kathleen Rusnak and Claire Pace first visited the clinic. The annual \$250,000 operating budget provides for over 100,000 patient visits. Fees are what one can pay, if anything. News from Haiti is grim: gang violence, kidnappings and killings. Amid this backdrop, Clinique Saint Esprit remains open, a beacon of hope in the neighborhood which treasures the medical staff and their life-giving work. Physicians risk their lives to come to work, but come to work they do. And with gasoline at \$29.00 a gallon - when one can get it - transportation is an arduous work-around. But, people still need health care; and the entire health care community in Haiti is doing their darnedest to deliver it. The U.S. Ambassador to Haiti, Rick Barton, said in a phone call last week that the United States recognizes that the voice of the health care community is the true voice of the Haitian population and, as such, is deeply respected.

So, this month, we have the opportunity to touch lives, indeed, to save lives. Because a serious Covid outbreak in Memphis occasioned the cancellation of the annual Haiti Medical Missions of Memphis fundraising run, our help is needed more than ever. As we ponder our many blessings this Thanksgiving, please share generously of your gifts with Clinique Saint Esprit so that this beacon of hope may continue to shine brightly. Generous donors will match whatever you contribute.

It Takes a Parish!

It takes an entire parish, including you, to support all that St. Andrew's is and does. That's true as we worship, when lay participants play key roles and the entire congregation provides a meaningful shared context. It's true for our beyond-worship activities, supported and often led by volunteers. And it's true when it comes to funding what we provide through St. Andrew's for each other and the larger community.

This is the season of our annual "campaign" to confirm financial support of our next budget. In recent years we have minimized the intensity and duration of that effort. Thanks to your past prompt and generous pledge responses, we are repeating that low-key format.

You will soon receive a letter (if not, please inform the office) describing our \$435,000 pledge goal, an 8% increase over last year's pledges, and what we believe is needed from the parish to accomplish our ministries in the coming year. Basic "operating" costs are going up, and to expand our work as outlined in the referenced letter, we will need this modest additional funding.

Thank you for past giving! Looking ahead, we ask that you make your 2023 pledge soon, which will aid our planning. If renewing a prior pledge, please consider an increase of at least 8%, should your household finances allow.

On Sunday, 4 December we will bless our pledges in worship, as we look forward to a well-funded 2023 for St. Andrew's.

In other news, our three Vestry working groups are focused on these initial actions, all of which invite your participation:

*Christian Formation – Post-worship sermon conversations and five weeks of "God 101"

*Engaging Young Families and Children – Monthly Messy Church

*Supporting Older Church Members - Restart of Eucharistic Visitor program

Our Work So Far on Parish Priorities

Christian formation - Chuck Thompson, Joe Daly, Mike Quinn, Alice Perry

- ⇒ Foster improved biblical literacy amongst church members
- ⇒ Offer education programs that reach people in and beyond our church community
- ⇒ Develop short course on Christian basics for those new to faith

<u>Christian Formation</u> is the lifelong growth in the knowledge, service and love of God as followers of Christ, through the study of Scripture presented in a manner that captures and piques interest and fosters a lifelong curiosity in the word of God.

There are many resources available to accomplish the goals of Christian formation, so many that trying to sort out useful ones could be a daunting, time consuming and possibly discouraging task. In that interest, the Vestry has investigated those sources most available and narrowed down the options for ease of access, use, timeliness and broad appeal. Engaging children and families can take many shapes and forms as we've seen with the "Dodge, Drum, and Sing" after school program we started last year. Out of that program came a desire to develop and expand a Messy Church program at St. Andrew's. Given the attendance we've seen, we are going to continue with this as a new worship service we offer once a month and are committing to it for the coming year.
